<ul> <li>English exercise book</li> <li>Current reading book, which is suitable for Accelerated Reader</li> <li>Reading Olympiad booklet</li> <li>Their English teacher will issue the set texts (e.g. copies of novel or plays) that are being used in session and collect these back at the end of each session.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Encourage your child to read widely and regularly, making use of the Reading Olympiad lists that are issued to students at the start of the academic year.</li> <li>Encourage your child to read/watch/listen to the news on a daily basis and discuss these current affairs with them.</li> <li>Encourage them to complete the homework tasks they are set by their English teachers to a high standard, asking them to show you the finished work.</li> </ul>
