Year 8 students celebrate the Centenary of the first non-stop flight across the Atlantic

On Friday 21 June, 11 year 8 students were awarded with a trip to Rolls Royce for their outstanding effort levels.

They were invited to experience the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the first non-stop trans-Atlantic flight in 1919 and to witness the opening of the new aviation exhibition. John Alcock and Arthur Brown made the first non-stop flight across the Atlantic in a Vickers Vimy aircraft powered by two Rolls-Royce Eagle engines. The Year 8 students experienced a day jam packed with exciting activities including a tour of the fascinating hall of the

heritage centre. When the students arrived they were quizzed on their knowledge of aviation, listened to speeches by retired engineers and observed the grand opening of the new learning exhibition by Sir Ralph Robins. Afterwards, they built a small scale engine and had the chance to look further into the making of an engine. A tour followed around the hall of the heritage centre by a retired Rolls Royce engineer, this included the physical evolution of the Rolls Royce engines through the ages and learnt how they operate using the "Suck, Squeeze, Bang, Blow" method. After their lunch break, they browsed the newly opened exhibition observing the

development of aircrafts and then each had a go with the VR device. The students loved how they could see the engines in 3D, and were able to zoom in on to the different parts. After a tiring and exciting day the students returned to Landau Forte College.



First Story Group

Supporting Cupcake Day

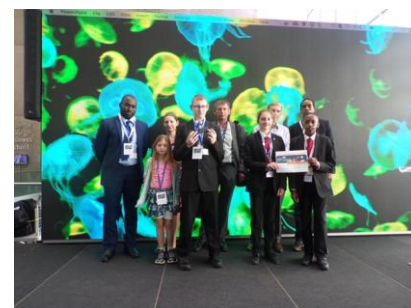

Landau students win prestigious national robotics competition

Landau Forte students who participate in an after school club have come out victorious in a national robot building competition. Landau Robotics is an recently started afterschool club for students with a passion for building and designing robots to solve practical tasks.

In the national competition the students came top of the class in the Parking Challenge, the Drilling Challenge, and even had two teams come joint first in the Terrain Challenge

The winning students, plus their parents and Mr Armah, were honoured at an award ceremony at the International Robotics Showcase in June held at the Royal Geographical Society in London. As part of their prize, the students have won a Miro-E robot for the school. Miro-E is an advanced AI robot adapted for education with robust hardware and a specialised programming interface to facilitate students' coding. Well done to all involved!



The Brilliant Club

From February to May of this year a number of year 10 students took part in The Brilliant Club. This is a project designed to encourage students to aspire to attend top achieving universities. The start of the project certainly lived up

to this as we visited the lovely setting of St Hugh's College in Oxford for our launch visit. We had a tour of the facilities of the College (which was one of the earliest colleges in the university to admit women, and there were lots of inspiring stories of pioneering women in academia.) The students got to spend time with the undergraduates and also had their initial lecture with our liaison tutor Jessica Runacres – a PhD student whose area of expertise is data-mining, a fascinating and sharply contemporary topic. Jessica's first degree is in psychology so this formed the basis of the project the students explored. It concerned the issue of memory and as part of the project students had to conduct fieldwork and recruit subject for their experiment. Over the course of the weekly seminars students built up their data and their findings with Jessica. The pressure was great – the

students were actually creating an undergraduate piece of work – that was going to be marked to degree level standard. Jessica proved to be an admirable tutor, giving the students timely feedback on their work through the projects VLE.

The students worked amazingly well – a final viva session with Jessica secured their grades and we travelled to the equally sunny and lovely Nottingham University campus for our graduation ceremony. There were student there from all over the East Midlands and a selection of them outlined their projects in fascinating detail. Eventually Landau Forte went forward to receive their certificates. Of the eleven students who completed the project six students gained first class honours and all of them passed – a stunning achievement. All of the young people are now considering attending university and having been shown the workings of Russell Group universities, these are the top achieving universities in the UK, many of the students are considering applying to these prestigious establishments. We wish them every success in their future endeavours.

Year 11 Leavers' Ball
